Ivy House Farm: 1983









As with virtually the whole of the township of Elton, Ivy House Farm was part of Lord Crewe's Estate so ultimately any land in the area would be returned to Lord Crewe. Many of the tenants built their own properties on the land knowing that was the case with the intention of extending the leases for further lives which Lord Crewe seemed quite happy to oblige by.

On the 1840 tithe map, Ivy House was under lease to Ellen Turner who was recorded as a widow. Her husband Thomas a builder who had built the house in about 1800 had died in 1829 and before the 1841 census was taken, Ellen had also died.

Thomas first took out the lease on the property in 1801 on the lives of himself, his wife and a young Samuel Shaw and the lease was renewed in 1828 taking on further land. This lease has Joseph Turner the son as a third name replacing Samuel and also confirms that a second property had recently been erected on the site.



The Turner family had been in Elton for many years and can be traced back at least to 1780 through the land tax returns and there was a Randle Turner who died at Elton in 1719, probably the great grandfather of Thomas.



In the 1841 census, Thomas and Ellen's son Joseph was recorded at the property along with his wife and six children. It is interesting to note that on the face of it there were three buildings on the land, were these all built by the Turner's themselves?

Certainly the building next to Elton Moss Bridge was a residential property in times gone by and this was split off from Ivy House some time later.

Ten years later, Joseph was also noted as a farmer and a grocer, so he will have been making full use of the 7 acres of land that he leased, then after a further ten years, he seems to have given up the bricklaying probably as a result of his age.

At the start of the new decade a tragedy struck the Turner family when Jabez's grandson died in an accident whilst outside playing on the moss. His eldest daughter Mary had stayedhad stayed in Crewe and married a William Dean and it was their first born Frank wh died on this fateful day.

Mary and William actually had a torrid time in the 1880's with their first 5 children all dying under the age of 6. Perhaps this was the reason they continually moved around crewe to get away from the memories.

They eventually had two further sons who lived to a good age.

#### CHILD DROWNED AT ELTON.

An enquiry before Dr. Baird, deputy coroner, took place at the Commercial Hotel, Elton, on Monday, relative to a very sad case of drowning. Mr. and Mrs. Dean of 197, West-street, Crewe, visited Mrs. Dean's father, Mr. James Turner, living at Elton, on Saturday last, and they had with them their little son Frank, a child of twenty months old. Whiist the elder persons were having tea on Saturday evening, the little boy Dean went outside to divert himself with another little boy of five years, named Alfred Dean. After they had been a short time gone, the mother of the child Dean went out to look after him, and was considerably slarmed to see of the children the house. She made a search, and in returning to the house through the orchard passed a cosspool of liquid refuse, and on its surface a painful sight attracted her attention-the outstretched a ms of her little one. The mother's awe stricken scream quickly brought the father out of the back door of the house; and he realizing at once the weeful circumstances, pulled the shild It wa out of the nozious mire. The unfortunate behaved in a strange manner. In an hour after the sad occurrence he could not be found; ultimately discovered and he was behind a large plum tree in the garden. The jur returned a verdict of "Accidentally drewned; and Dr. Baird in summing up the evilence remarked on the exposed position of the cess-pool; and the necessity of having it railed round.

Jabez Turner died in 1906 having lived his whole life at Ivy House (as with his father) besides some time he spent in Crewe. His wife Emily stayed there for the rest of her life until she died in 1920.



In the meantime, as the war approached, Lord Crewe decided to sell his estate. The Turner's had in their time at least three Lord Crewe Landlords but due to diminishing returns from agricultural land and financial difficulties, Lord Crewe started off the process of selling the estate. This process was completed in 1936 with the sale of the hall.

The Estate in Warmingham, Tetton and Elton was first put up for sale in 1915 where it failed to sell with the land around Ivy House Farm being put up in four separate lots.

Three years later in the Summer of 1915, the Elton portion of the Estate was sold by Robert Offley Ashburton Crewe-Milnes, the nephew of Hungerford Crewe who by then had been elevated to the title Marquiss of Crewe for sale, only for it to be withdrawn at the last moment and privately sold to Francis J Poole.





In the 1918 sale, Ivy House was sold as a single smallholding of about 10 acres. The two fields from the 1840 tithe map, one behind Watch Lane Cottage & one off Red Lane were sold seperately.

The private sale was made to Francis J Poole a local businessman solicitor who had married one of the daughters of Edwin Foden. His name lives on today as Poole Alcock

Francis Poole then set about selling on the estate generally back to the existing tenants, no doubt with a markup for himself. In total 20 properties over 93 acres of land were sold.

THE LATE MRS E. D. TURNER.

The funeral of the late Mrs Emily D. Turner, widow of the late Mr Jabez Turner, of Elton Moss, took place at St. Peter's Church, Elworth, on Satunday. The deceased lady, who was 32 years of age, was one of the oldest residents of the district. The service was conducted by the Vicar, the Rev. T. Lunt.

The mourners were Mesdames M. Dean, E. Moores, and K. Potts (claughters), Messrs J. E. Turner, W. Furner. and J. F. Turner (sons), W. Dean, and S. Moores (sons-in-law), Mesdames J. E. Turner and W. Emily Turner was the purchaser of Ivy House and she continued to live there until she died in 1920, followed by her son Wesley who eventually moved out in 1931. Wesley continued the family tradition working as a bricklayer.
