


Longfold House 2023







Longfold in 1840 was a tenement with many occupiers covering roughly half an acre of land. The 1898 map before it was demolished gives a clearer picture of the layout.

In 1840 at the time of the tithe map, the property was occupied by William Charlesworth and his family.

Why William was named and none of the other tenants is unclear. Perhaps he was the principal tenant, most long standing or even alphabetically first?


At that time, this area was heavily populated with 96 people living in the confines of the map shown opposite.

Elton Smithy was then a Public House, the White Hart Inn with Kester Kettell the landlord who would have had a busy time with the local trade.

Kester's uncle Ralph Kettle was at Elton Hall Farm where brewing was one of the farming activities.

William Pierpoint of Elton Villa was described as a shopkeeper in an 1843 newspaper (burglary) report.

The Elton poorhouse had been in the locality (Plot 279) but it seems to have been demolished by this time.



The 1841 census tells us there were seven households in the Longfold tenement in 1841. Later census returns and historic maps would that these were a row of very small cottages of perhaps two or three habitable rooms. William Charlesworth was one of 29 people living in the properties so this area will have been a busy part of Elton.

Of the seven households, in five the head of the household was an agricultural labourer and the other two had elderly widows. There would have been plenty of work for these labourers at the local farms of which there were many.

The land tax records (which run until 1831) confirm that the land on which Longfold was built was leased to Samuel Latham (1771-1834) with Samuel being the youngest son of William Latham who held the lease at Fields Farm in Elton. William Charlesworth, was the only one of these tenants remaining in 1841 paying nearly a florin of rent per year.

Moving on ten years, to 1851 there were five inhabited properties at Longold with 2 being noted as uninhabited. This was in all likelihood due to the properties awaiting new tenants after previous ones moved out and an indication of the reasonably quick turnover of occupants.

As an example, William Lee appears in the 1851 with four young children, which eventually became ten. Hill eldest daughter was born in 1846 in Tetton. By 1853 children were born in Sandbach suggesting William was at Longfold for perhaps five or six years. No doubt there were many other Victorian occupants at Longfold who never appear in any records having not been there when the census returns were taken.

On the other hand, despite there being many short term tenants who just came and went, there is also evidence of two families at Longfold for many years passing the cottages down through the generations.

Firstly there is William Charlesworth who died in 1846. In the 1851 census his widow Esther was still at the property. Their daughter, also Martha married Joseph Dodd and two of their grandchildren through that line were there in the 1860s to 1880s.


The individual who helps us to understand the position at Longfold most clearly is Matilda Cooke (1823-1910) who was born at Longfold and spent her whole life there being described as of "Independent Means". Her baptism record at Warmingham explains the position. Thomas Brookes who also originally came from Brereton like Ann was probably Ann's brother.

So Matilda seems to be the product of a master/servant relationship which was all too common in Victorian times. What is perhaps a little more surprising is that Samuel Latham (who was the youngest son of William Latham, a wealthy farmer who lived at Fields Farm, Elton) seems to have openly accepted the child and taken the responsibility for her upbringing.

Neither Ann or Samuel ever married and they never had any further children. With the passage of time, it is difficult to understand the exact nature of this relationship but in Samuel's will of 1834 he leaves everything to Ann for life (See appendix 3). After her death, everything went to their daughter Matilda. This is a typical will of a husband catering for his wife which would suggest they had a closer relationship than the description of "Housekeeper" in his will which is perhaps a bit cold.

James Cooke had married Matilda and no doubt it was their intention to have a large family however despite their best efforts, only two of their Children, Frederick (1851-1930) and Oliver (1847-1925) lived beyond childhood and all but one of their deceased siblings died before the age of 5.

This must have been particularly difficult for the two boys witnessing the deaths of so many siblings.

By the time of the census of 1871, Longfold was at its busiest with 30 people living at the tenement, after that time, the numbers started to drop off as some were combined and perhaps some became derelict.

There are certainly records in the Crewe estate that confirm those occupied by Frederick and Oliver Cooke were combined into a single unit.



By this time, there are also indications of the agricultural revolution as work became more mechanised. As a result people started to seek alternative employment, so as well as agricultural labourers, we also have labourers on the Railways and the Rookery Bridge Bone Mill. Frederick and Oliver Cooke were at one time Road labourers.

The matriarch of Longfold Matilda Cooke died in 1910. John Aldersea died in 1912 and Hugh Glover had moved to Malkins Bank by 1913 just leaving the Cooke brothers in situ.

Within a few years the tenement was abandoned to the extent that when the Elton estate was sold in 1915, Longfold was described as a "building site".





The occupiers of the land when the estate was sold were the brothers Frederick and Oliver Cooke already mentioned and Richard Whittaker Oulton a local farmer. By this time, Frederick and Oliver had moved to Watch Lane Cottage on Elton Moss.



Lot 32.—Longfold building site, let to Messrs. Fred and Oliver Cooke, and gardens let to Messrs. R. W. and R. Oulton, 5 acres 21 perches, rent £12, withdrawn at £225.

Lot 33.—Cottage holding in Hall-lane, comprising 5 acres 1 rood 1 perch, let to Mr. Thomas Lovatt, rent £20 5s., sold to Mr. Boston, Sandbach, for £470.

As it turned out, Longfold failed to sell at the auction. The next lot, number 33 in the auction was Smithy Farm where Thomas Lovatt had been the tenant albeit for only about 4 years. Whether or not he had the resource to purchase the Smithy is perhaps immaterial and it was sold to an Arthur Boston from Warmingham.

What is clear though is that subsequent to the auction, Longfold was sold to Thomas Lovatt and he set about building a new home for himself on the land. How long it took him to build the Longfold House as we know it today is unclear but he didn't actually start paying rates on the property until 1926.

A half acre plot of land off Crabmill Lane was sold to his brother Harry.

In 1918 when further property from the estate was sold some three years later, Frederick became the owner of Watch Lane Cottage.

By the time of the national register of 1939, Thomas had built a bungalow on part of what was quite an extensive plot. This may well have ultimately been intended for his son Wilfred but as with many others of his generation, he lost his life during the war whilst fighting in Italy.

As such it was Thomas's daughter Mary who took up residence in the bungalow, probably after her wedding in 1939 and she and her husband lived there for nearly 20 years before selling up. Thomas Lovatt died in 1960 and his wife continued to live at the main house until her own death six years later.





Appendix 3 – Will of Samuel Latham

The Last Will and Jestament of me Samuel Latham of the Township of Etton in the parish of Warningham, in the County of Chester, is as follows - That is to say, First - Forder that all my just Debto shall be bais as soon after my decease as can conveniently be done in that my Body be interred in Warningham Church yard, and that a good GraveStone be laid upon me as soon As possible - I give and bequeath to Ann Brooks, my House keeper, all my Leasehold Houses and Lands, utuate in Elson; together with all my Sausehold Furniture, Goods and Chattels, and all my Farming Stock, live and Dead, and all my property by whatever name or names it may be called or known by, for her to have posels and enjoy during her natural life or so long as she continues unmarlied; but if she maries, she shall lose all right whatever I have given her, and I order that matital Brooks Daughter of

froherhy aforesaid, and enjoy the same as long as she lives; and shall have full hower to leave by Will and divide the said property as she shall think proper; and sappoint for my laccutors George Johnson of Marmingham Schoolmaster. Ann Brooks my Housekeeper, and Marmingham Brooks daughter of Ann Brooks both of Elton; and I do declare this to be my last Will and Testament this Sourth day of August one thousand eighthundred and thusty four
